

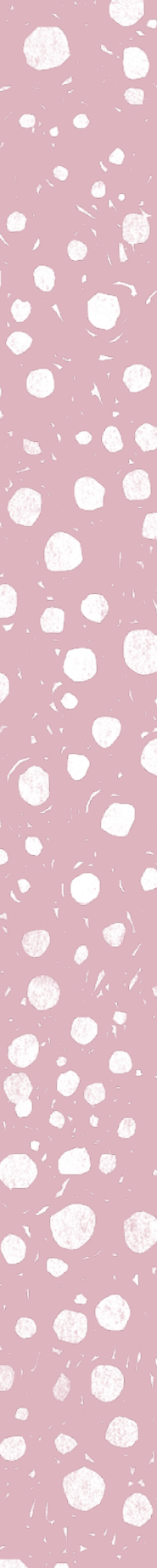
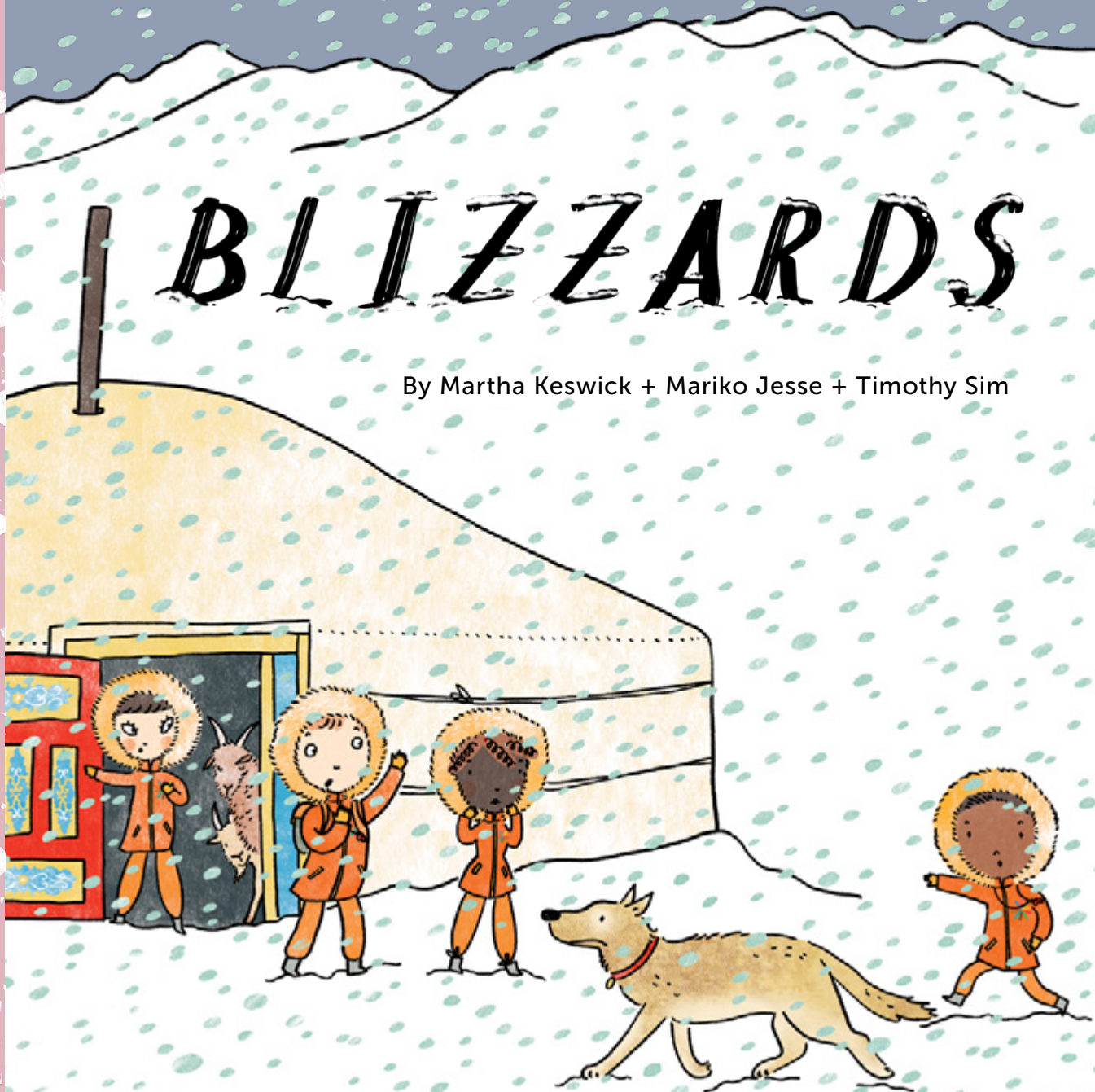

What are natural hazards ... and disasters?

Forces of nature that happen with little warning and occur all over the world, such as earthquakes, tsunamis, floods, landslides, tropical cyclones (and other storms), storm surges, heatwaves, wildfires, droughts and volcanic eruptions. When these **natural hazards** pose a threat to humans or the environment they can lead to **disasters**, and cause destruction in a community.

What are blizzards?

A blizzard is a powerful and severe **snowstorm**. The combination of freezing temperatures, strong winds, and huge amounts of snow creates this dangerous weather condition. During a blizzard, the blowing snow makes it difficult to see far.

The World Meteorological Organization helps countries to better forecast and manage blizzards.

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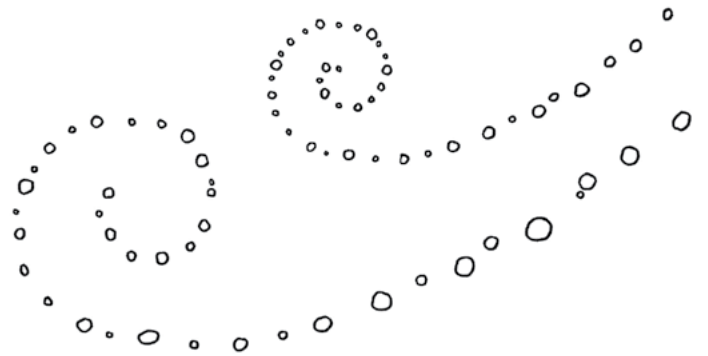
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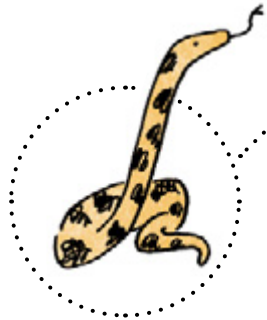
Who is Grand Mistress Fu?

A famous Chinese martial arts teacher and founder of the Mount Emei Wushu School. Grand Mistress Fu, also known as Shifu, is disciplined and tough yet has an enormous heart. She narrowly escaped death as her school collapsed during the Wenchuan Earthquake in May 2008 and has since dedicated her life to Disaster Risk Reduction.



What is The COPE Academy?

An international disaster hub, hidden in Sichuan Province, set up by Grand Mistress Fu. The COPE Squad – Candy, Ollie, Ping and Eddy are teenage orphans who were plucked out of their care homes to live at The COPE Academy and trained to be disaster risk reduction agents.

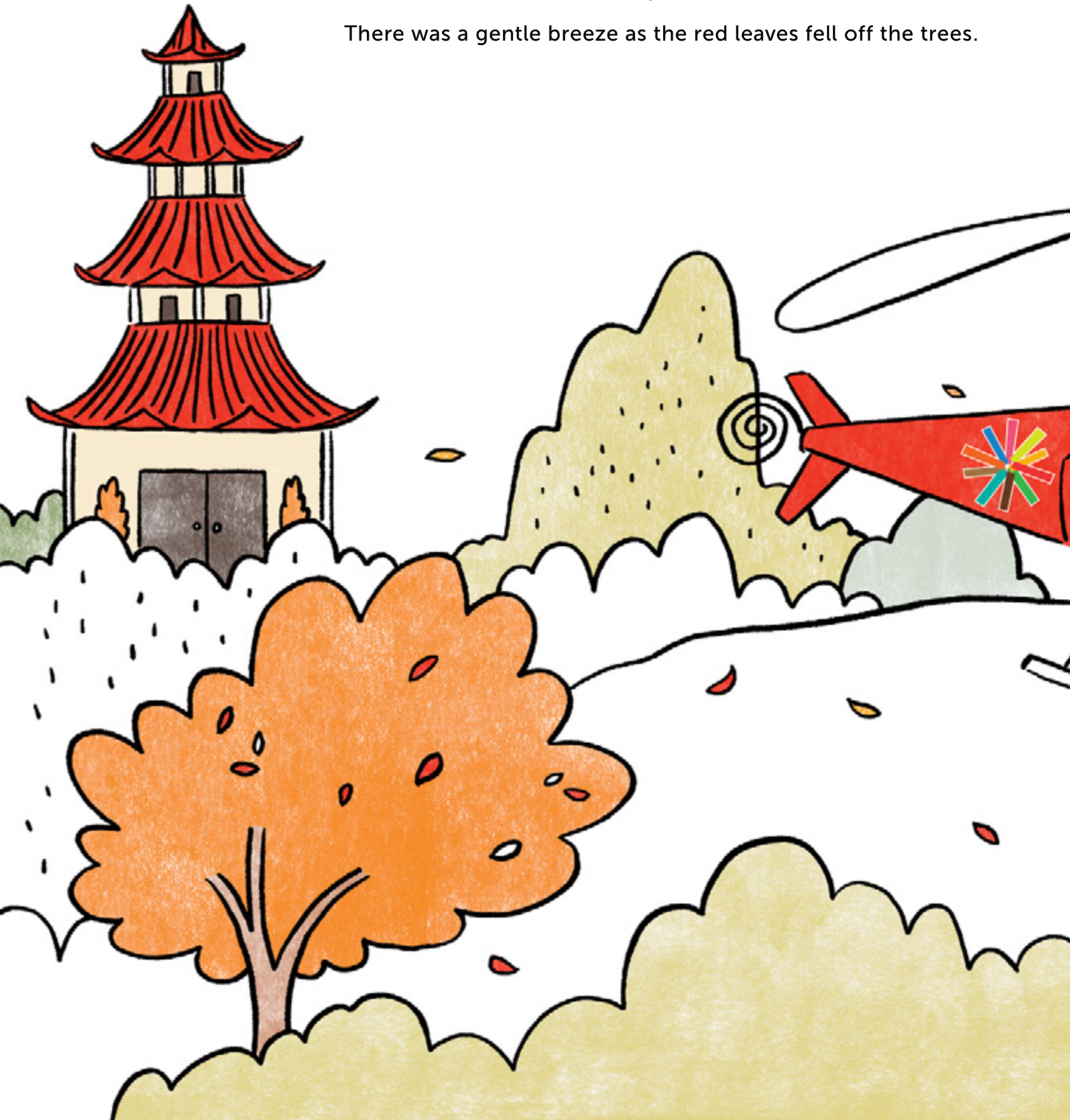


COPE Signs

Shhhh Candy, I'm trying to focus.

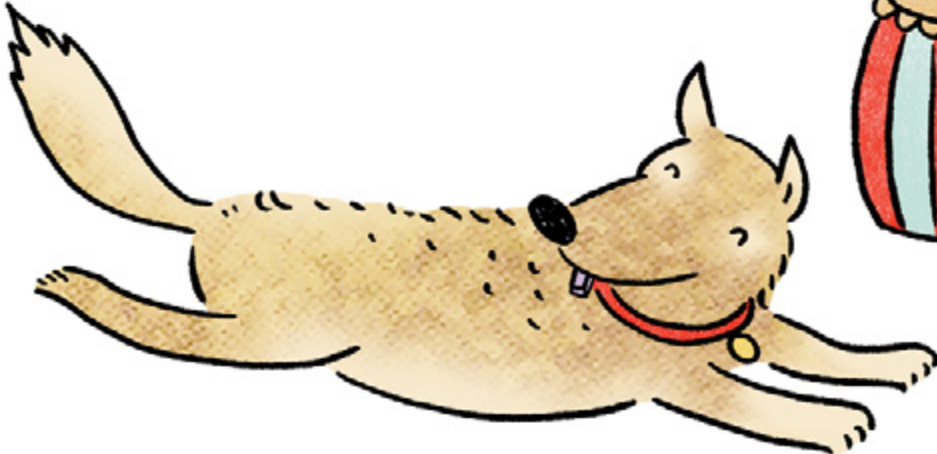

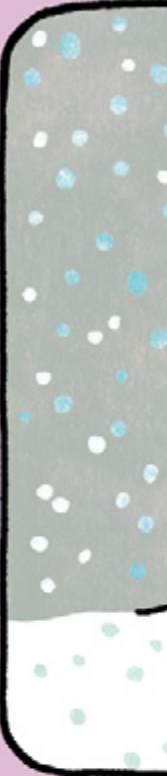

Close the windows.

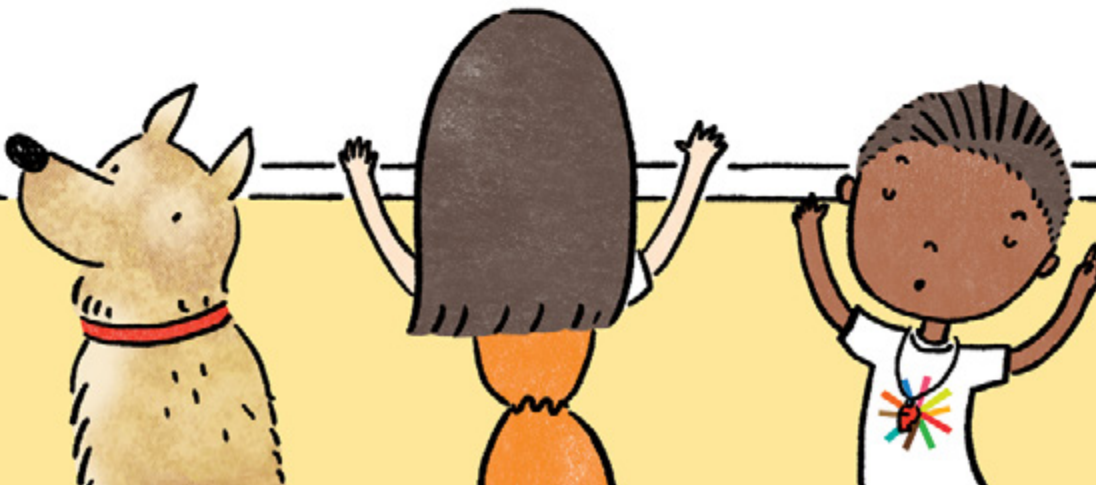


Eat and drink lots!

AND AFTER A BLIZZARD?

Listen to local government and weather updates.



Once it is safe to go outside, be careful when walking on icy roads.



Dress warmly. Wear thermals, a scarf, gloves, a winter hat and waterproofs.





Use your food stores wisely.



Check on your neighbours.

As the land of eternal blue sky, Mongolia has 250 sunny days a year.

A teenage girl named Nomu was there to greet them.

Welcome! You arrived just before the 'dzud'.

What is a dzud?

A dzud is a hazard created by a summer drought followed by a long cold winter. This prevents animals from grazing, and sadly leads to many livestock deaths.

In Mongolia's nomadic society, livestock are precious and are known as The Five Jewels: horses, cows, goats, sheep and camels.



COPE spent the first few days visiting primary schools.

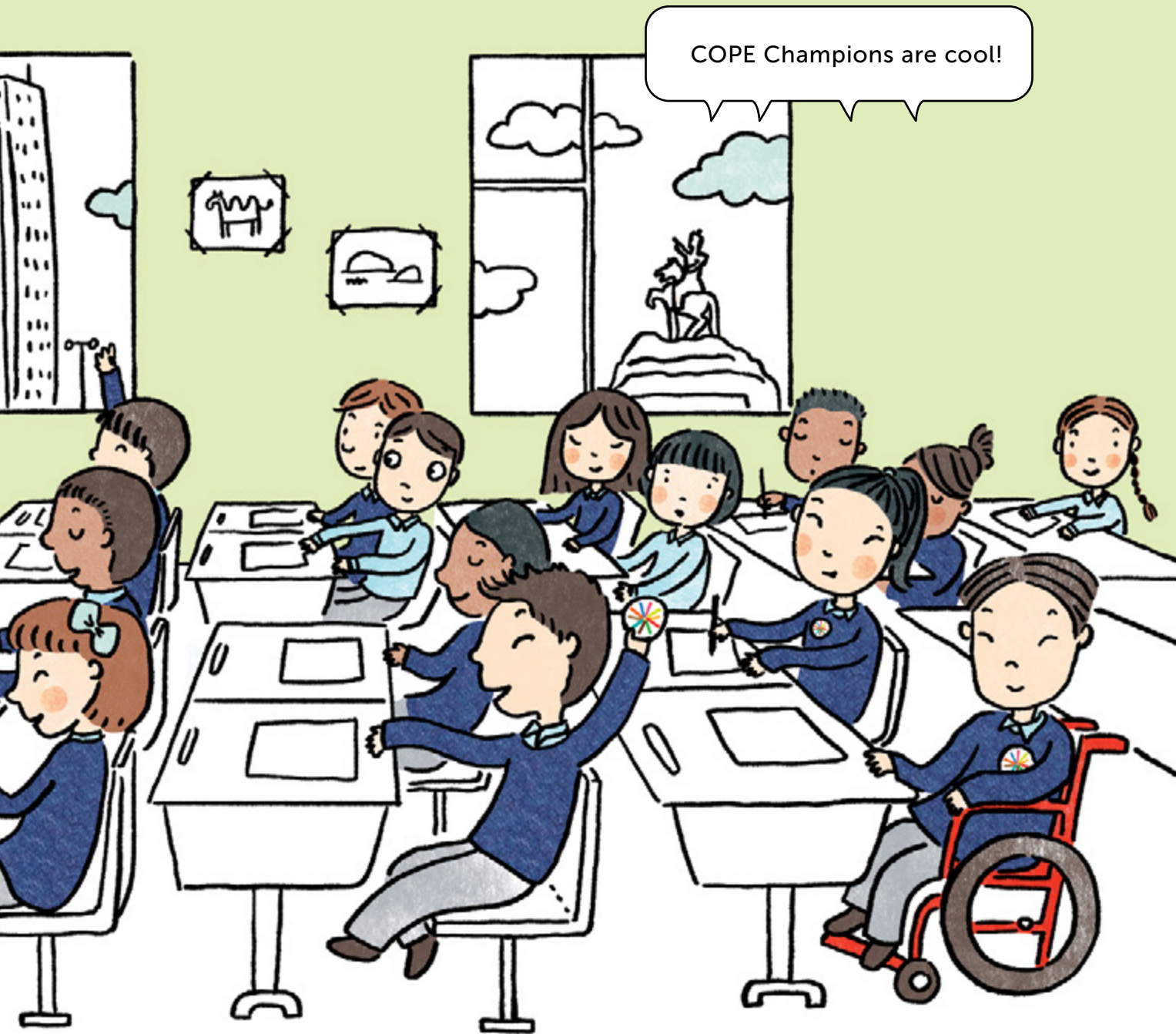

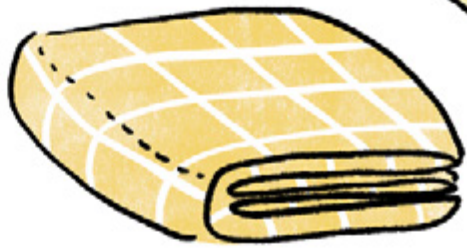

COPE visited NAMEM (National Meteorological Agency of Environmental Monitoring), where they learnt from the weather experts.

Mongolia has a wide range of natural hazards – dzuds, blizzards, floods, dust storms, droughts, wildfires and earthquakes.

Blizzards happen between October and May, 5–15 days per year. They can devastate communities.

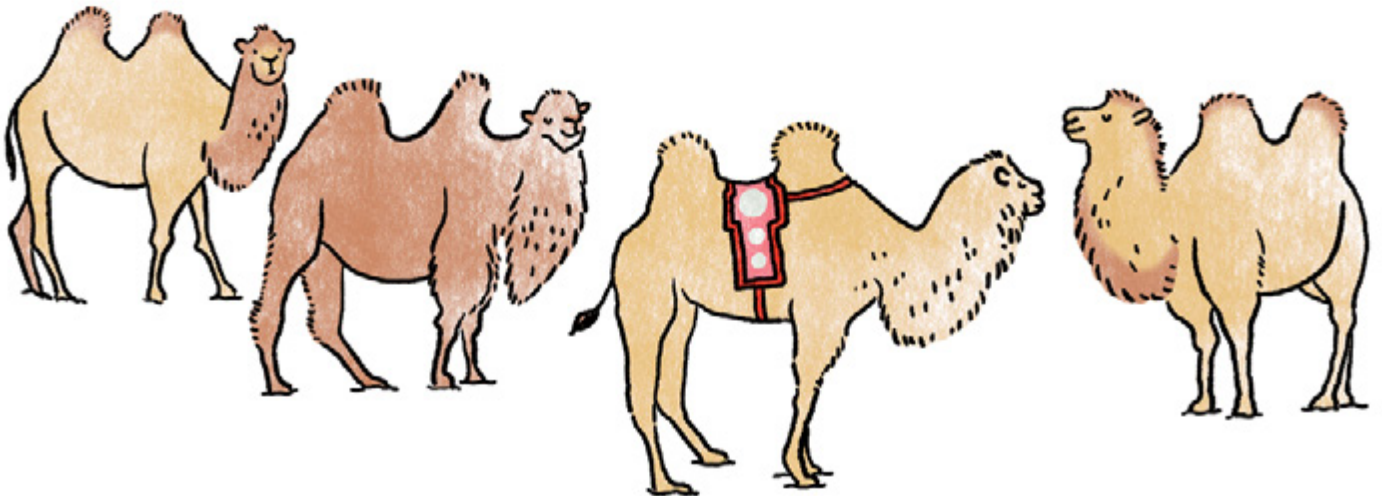


They drove through the most stunning, sweeping countryside and grassy plains, known as the 'steppe'.

Yes. Mongolian camels have 2 humps.

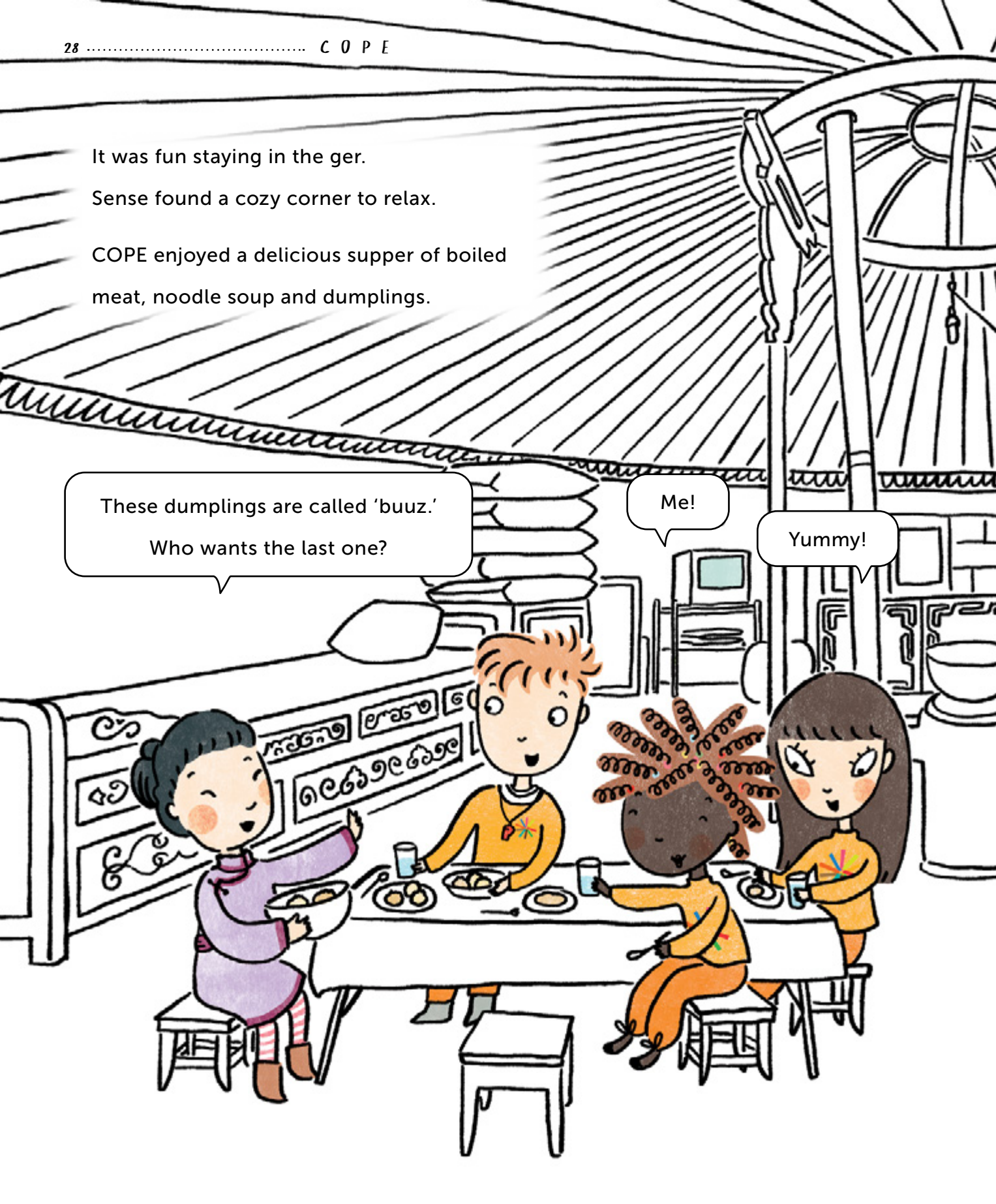


It was fun staying in the ger.

The next morning they woke up to heavy snow. Nomu's family had been preparing for the dzud since September, when grass cutting began.



Blankets had been made for the cows. Animal shelters had been set up.

There were huge piles of hay, firewood, and extra fuel.

Meat and cheese were frozen outside, enough to last the winter.



COPE travelled to the next door herding families.

Every day the children milked the cows, and guided their horses to drink at the well.



We never venture out alone. We always tell our parents where we are going and what time we will be back.

We wear lots of layers and furry hats!
That's how we stay warm.



In the local town, COPE paid special attention to *vulnerable people*, leaving no one behind.

It is easy for me to slip, so I use my cane for extra balance.



On snowy days I ask a friend to join me, to help with the opening and closing of doors. I always make sure to replace the rubber tips on my crutches.



COPE set up special clubs for the nomadic children who lived in dormitories.

COPE taught them how to stay safe and warm during the dzud season.

Pack your survival bag.

COPE always found time to have some fun.



By mid-December, the dzud was in full force. The herders started melting and boiling the snow to make *drinking water*.



Animals struggling to reach the grass were now moved into pens.



Because of the dzud, there is a lot of snow and no grass. My family do not have the money to buy hay. It is hard to watch our animals suffer.

Suddenly there were reports on the TV and radio of a serious blizzard coming in. Families stocked up on food and water. They made sure they had enough warm clothes and rechecked their survival bags.



Some herders even brought their goats into the gers during the freezing nights.

A strong wind had picked up, at a speed of *22 metres per second.*



It was bitterly cold as the temperature dropped to *-40 Celsius.*

On the roads, trucks were stuck.
Bridges were blocked. Schools were closed.

COPE stayed inside the ger, huddling up by the fire as they listened to the howling winds. They kept calm.

All of a sudden, they realized Rescue was no longer there. A knock on the orange door. There was Nomu holding a baby sheep, with a shivering Rescue.



We went out to check on the animals. We worked quickly as we could only see one metre in front of us. Then I heard some *barking*. It was Rescue who had found the baby sheep, buried in the snow.

Poor thing. He's so cute.
Let's give him some milk.

Clever Rescue!
Good job.



The blizzard lasted for almost nine hours. When it was finally declared safe to go outside, COPE put on their warm clothes.



They helped clear up the mess, shoveling away snow from around the gers and fixing the broken cattle pens. Most importantly COPE kept everyone's spirits up.



As life slowly returned to normal, COPE waved goodbye and began their long journey home.

Back on Mount Emei, it was almost Lunar New Year. It had been a tough mission, but COPE looked forward to the celebrations.

Soon the COPE Academy was a sea of red and gold lanterns, with flowers blooming for the coming of Spring.
